Let us receive both with faith, and see God's goodness even during our troubles, for that is when we need to rely on the strength he provides. What did Job say? (Job 2:10) *"Shall we receive good from God, and shall we not receive evil?"* What did Paul say? *"I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me"* (Php. 4:12-13). There are good things and hard things that we will face. In one breath, the New Testament urges us, *"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing..."* (1 Thess. 5:16-17)

Our Devotions in March

This month in our daily readings, we will be finishing Leviticus, reading through Numbers, finishing the Gospel of Mark, and beginning the Gospel of Luke. The Psalms cover 56 to 83. What are the keys to remember as we approach these books?

Leviticus: This book gives many of the regulations or ceremonial laws governing worship, the tabernacle, sacrifice, the priesthood, and the feasts for the Jewish calendar. Remember that all of these things pointed to Jesus and what he would do as our High Priest when he offered himself in sacrifice for us on the cross.

Numbers: This book recounts the 40 years of life in the wilderness, when they had been freed from Egypt but had not yet inherited the promised land. The New Testament typically compares Christians to the Israelites during this period, because we have been freed from Satan and the slavery of sin, but have not yet received the fulfillment of all God's promises and the kingdom of Christ. Pay attention to the ways that they were test-ed, and the ways they tested God!

Mark: This Gospel focuses on Jesus' authority and power. Notice how often it says, "immediately"! The name of the author John Mark means "Grace Hammer" and Jesus has that kind of power and authority and grace, doesn't he?

Luke: This Gospel focuses on Jesus' humanity. Luke was a doctor, well acquainted with the human condition and all its pain and suffering. That's his focus. Jesus is/was God but also a true man with a real human nature. Pay attention to Jesus' kindness, emotions, mercy, sympathy, and sufferings.

Psalms: Book One of the Psalms is Psalm 1-42, and it generally deals with personal trials and private worship, or "my problems" and "my relationship with God." Book Two of the Psalms begins at Psalm 42 and goes through Psalm 72. The general theme of this section is *personal trials and corporate worship*. We bring our personal burdens with us as we gather for worship, and look to the Lord for his help. It is "my trials" and "our worship." Book Three begins at Psalm 73 and goes through Psalm 89. The theme of this section is corporate trials and corporate worship. There are problems and trials that we all face in common or together, and when we gather for worship we bring those before God, too – "our trials" and "our worship."

Hymn of the Month

Thomas Ken was born in 1637 in Hertfordshire, England. While still a child, he was orphaned and subsequently raised by an older sister. In 1651, young Thomas became a scholar and student at Winchester College. He received both a B.A. degree and an M.A. degree. He served for a time as a tutor in his college. Ken was ordained a minister in 1662 and served on the Isle of Wight. In 1672, he returned to Winchester College, where he became a "Curate in one of the lowest districts." A curate is defined in the Anglican Church as someone charged with the care of souls of a parish.

Thomas Ken is remembered in history for several notable things. First, he loved to sing and write hymns. Second, though a man of small stature, he was known for exceeding faith, courage, and charity. Lastly, he was a powerful and compelling orator and teacher. He cared for the souls of the students at Winchester, so much so in fact, that he combined his love and talents to write A Manual of Prayers for the Use of the Scholars of Winchester College in 1674. In it. he charged his readers to "be sure to sing the Morning and Evening Hymns in your chamber devoutly, remembering that the Psalmist, upon happy experience, assures you that it is a good thing to tell of the loving kindness of the Lord early in the morning and of his truth in the night season." Thomas Ken wrote a hymn for his students to sing each morning as they rose. The first verse reads as follows:

> Awake, my Soul and with the Sun, Thy daily Stage of duty run, Shake off dull Sloath, and joyful rise, to pay thy Morning Sacrifice.

All praise to Thee, who safe hast kept, and hast refreshed me whilst I slept, Grant, Lord, when I from Death shall wake, I may endless Light partake.

He wrote another hymn for his students to sing as they ended their day and retired for the night. It reads as follows: All praise to You, my God, this night, for all the blessings of the light.Keep me, O keep me, King of kings, beneath the shelter of Your wings.

Forgive me, Lord, for this I pray, the wrong that I have done this day. May peace with God and neighbor be, before I sleep restored to me.

Lord, may I be at rest in You and sweetly sleep the whole night thru, Refresh my strength, for Your own sake, so I may serve You when I wake.

This little man with the big heart, who cared so deeply for the devotion of his students and their relationship to their God, became known as one of the fathers of English hymnology. You may not know him for his morning and evening hymns, but you will surely know him for the last verse he added to both hymns. It is called "The Doxology," and is sung, like the Christian life of its author, with majesty the world over!

> Praise God from whom all Blessings flow, Praise him all Creatures here below, Praise him above, ye Heavenly Host. Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.



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
